



Immigration and Visa Guide for EU Students

What has changed?

On the 31st January 2020 the UK officially left the EU and entered into a transition period. The transition period ends on the 31st December 2020. After this date freedom of movement (the right to live, work, study and travel within the EU) will end and EU nationals must meet UK immigration requirements in order to live, work, study and travel to the UK.

What do I need to do?

If you are an EU, EEA or Swiss national, you continue to have permission to live, work, study and travel to the UK up until the 31st December 2020. If you will travel to the UK on or before 11pm on the 31st December 2020, you simply need to show your EU/EEA/Swiss passport or national ID card to enter the UK.

If you will live/study/work in the UK after the 31st December 2020, you must apply for immigration status under one of the three options below.

Irish nationals are exempt and will continue to have the right to live work and study in the UK after the 31st December 2020. In other words, Irish students who will travel to the UK from 1st January 2021 will not require a visa to travel or study.



Option 1: EU Settlement Scheme

We strongly recommend applying for this type of immigration status if you meet the eligibility requirements. The EU Settlement Scheme is free and offers you the most freedom and the least restrictions, compared to the other options.

This Scheme is intended to allow any EU/EEA/Swiss national to continue living in the UK if they arrived before the end of the transition period.

What are the requirements?

You must be resident (living) in the UK on or before 11pm on the 31st December 2020.
You must not have any serious criminal convictions.

How do I apply?

If you have a smartphone, visit your app store and type "EU Exit: ID Document Check". Then install and open the app. You complete a short form, take a scan/photograph your passport and take a selfie. Android and iPhones can be used but the app may not work with older models. If the app does not work on your phone, you can borrow a friend's phone. Please contact us if you have any difficulties.

The application is free.

What will I be granted?

Settled status – if you have been living in the UK for 5 years or more. This status allows you to live, work and study in the UK.

Pre-Settled status – if you have been living in the UK for less than 5 years. This status allows you to live, work and study in the UK. Once you have been in the UK for 5 years, you simply apply again and you should be given full Settled Status. You will lose this status if you leave the UK for a continuous 2 year period. If your absence was due to COVID-19 you may be eligible to apply for a further grant of Pre-Settled Status, refer to the Home Office EUSS COVID-19 Guidance (link below) for more information.

Once you have been granted Settled Status this will be permanent. You can only lose this status if you leave the UK for a continuous 5 year period.

If you have Pre-Settled status, this will be granted for a maximum of 5 years. You must apply for full Settled Status once you have been resident in the UK for 5 years and you must apply before the date your Pre-Settled Status expires. If your absence was due to COVID-19, refer to the Home Office COVID-19 EUSS Guidance (link below) for more information, as you may be eligible to apply for a further grant of Pre-Settled Status, in order to allow you to reach the 5 years. You must be able to show a continuous 5 year residence period to be eligible for full Settled Status. Please see the section below for more information on what is counted as 5 years continuous residence. You cannot extend your Pre-Settled status (unless you are eligible under the Home Office EUSS COVID-19 Guidance), so if you do not qualify for Settled Status before the date your Pre-Settled Status expires, you must leave the UK and apply for different immigration permission. While your Pre-Settled Status is valid, you will continue to have the right to live, work and study in the UK.

What is counted as 5 years residence – I plan to/I have already spent time outside the UK?

If you spend time outside the UK for any of the following reasons, you will still be considered to be resident in the UK, and this time will count towards your total time spent in the UK.

- No more than 6 months absence in any 12 month period
- One absence of over 6 months, but no more than 12 months and the absence was for an "important reason" such as study (e.g. Study Abroad/ERASMUS) , vocational training, an overseas posting, serious illness, pregnancy or childbirth
- An absence of any duration for compulsory military service, posting on Crown service (or certain family members of person on Crown Service) or period spent working in UK marine area.

COVID-19 Update - If you left the UK but continued your course of study online AND you left to UK for not more than 12 months, this is also considered to be an "important reason".

You are permitted to have two absences for an "important reason" but at least one of the absences must be due to COVID-19. Another new EUSS COVID-19 concession was introduced from the 10th June 2021, and this concession allows students to remain outside the UK for over 12 months for reasons relating to COVID-19. These reasons include students whose University advised them not to return to the UK, and to continue to study remotely from their home country, due to COVID-19. EU students in this situation should contact internationaladvice@uws.ac.uk to find out if you are eligible to be issued with a letter confirming this. Your eligibility will depend on the date you returned/intend to return to the UK and whether you are based on the Scottish or London campus.

If you spend more than 6 months outside the UK and it is not for one of the reasons above, you will not be considered to be resident in the UK.

I have applied for the Scheme and I have been asked for more documents – what should I provide?

The Home Office should tell you how long they think you have been resident in the UK. If it is less than 5 years, they may contact you to give you an opportunity to provide more documents to show you have been in the UK longer than their estimate. If they have estimated your time in the UK correctly, just reply and confirm you want to be granted Pre-Settled status. If they are wrong and you have been in the UK longer you can send them any of the documents below as evidence:

- UWS student status letter (will show your start date)
- Invoices for tuition fees and documentation issued by SAAS or student finance bodies
- Bank statements
- Employer letter, P60 and or P45

Can I work in the UK?

You can work in the UK with no restrictions if you have Settled or Pre-Settled status

Can I bring my family?

If your family members are EU/EEA/Swiss nationals and they are already in the UK or they will arrive on or before 11pm on 31st December 2020, they should apply for the EU settlement Scheme in their own right. If your family members are:

1. EU/EEA/Swiss nationals, who will arrive after the 31st December 2020

OR

2. Are not EU/EEA/Swiss nationals and they are not yet in the UK

AND:

3. They are your "close" family member, and

4. you have been granted Settled/Pre-Settled status, and

5. your relationship with your family member began on or before the 31st December 2020

Then your family member can apply for an EU Settlement Scheme Family Permit. This Permit allows your family to travel to the UK and is valid for 6 months. Within the 6 month period, your family member should then apply for the EU Settlement Scheme. For further information, visit the [Home Office website](#).

Option 2 – Visitor visa

What are the requirements?

This option is only available if you intend to study for a period of 6 months or less.

How do I apply?

EU/EEA and Swiss nationals will be able to enter the UK without applying for a visa before travel. You can enter the UK using the eGates and your EU/EEA/Swiss passport. Further information is available on the [Home Office website](#). Your passport must have a biometric symbol on the cover, otherwise you must talk to a border officer to be granted entry. Your passport must be valid for 6 months after the date you enter the UK. You will be admitted to the UK as a Visitor.

What will I be granted?

You will not receive any physical visa/stamp or immigration permission. Instead it is important that you keep your boarding pass or flight booking as proof of travel. If you are ever asked for proof of your status in the UK, you should present proof of your travel.

Can I work in the UK?

It is not possible to take any paid or unpaid employment under this immigration category. If you plan to work, you should apply under option 3.

Can I bring family?

You cannot bring family members under this immigration status, however, if your family members are EU/EEA/Swiss nationals, they can apply for their own Visitor visa in their own right.

Option 3 – Student visa

What are the requirements?

If you do not meet the requirements for the EU Settlement Scheme, you must apply for a Student visa. Under this type of immigration status the University must sponsor you and issue you with an electronic document called a Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS).

How do I apply?

You must apply online and upload supporting documents with your application. Full instructions are available in our Student Visa Guide Outside the UK, available on [our webpages](#).

What will I be granted?

You will first be given a vignette (a visa stamp inside your passport) that allows you to travel to the UK. You must travel within the validity period of the vignette (90 days). Once you arrive in the UK you will be asked to collect your Biometric Residence Permit (BRP). This BRP is your visa and you will collect it from a Post Office (which you choose during the application process). You must normally collect your BRP within 10 days but, if you are required to self-isolate/quarantine on entry to the UK the Post Office will automatically keep your BRP until you are able to collect it.

Can I work?

You will be restricted to a maximum of 10 or 20 hours of work per week, depending on your course of study. During official vacation periods, and after you have completed your course, you may work full-time. There are some restrictions on the type of work you can do, and you cannot be self-employed. Can I bring family?

You can only bring your family if you are studying on certain types of course and you may only bring your children and spouse/civil partner/unmarried partner, subject to meeting additional proof of relationship requirements.
