This Masters' Level Module (level 11) provides an opportunity for primary and secondary teachers and educators in the wider community sector to engage in professional learning in Citizenship and Holocaust Education in relation to government policies, current issues and wider philosophical, socio-political, religious and cultural perspectives.

About this module

This learning module gives you the opportunity to enhance your professional practice in, and understanding of a wide range of relevant themes in Citizenship and Holocaust Education.

Learning and teaching contexts and implications for practitioners and learners in schools, museum and wider community contexts will be examined. Learning within this module is focussed on five main themes:

- Critical Perspectives and Principles of Citizenship and Holocaust Education
- Challenges and Possibilities of Critical/ Democratic Citizenship and Holocaust Education
- Teaching Pedagogies involved in Citizenship and Holocaust Education: Theory and Practical Application
- Antisemitism
- Approaching Holocaust Education in a Post-Truth World

The module will encourage you to reflect upon and enhance your practice and understanding of these issues.

Your learning

Participants will engage with relevant textual and audio visual resources (through the University's interactive e-learning environment) and have opportunities to participate in Microsoft Teams tutorials, receive feedback on their academic writing, and reflect on their own practice and professional development in Holocaust studies.

Materials are supplied online and the system allows access to electronic journals and e-books

Participants will be encouraged to reflect upon, and enhance their practice through engagement with these themes.

A written assessment will be submitted in December 2023 in order to complete the module.

Upon successful completion students will gain 20 credits at Masters' level (level 11).

Entry Requirements

Applicants must satisfy the specific admission requirements for Masters' level modules offered by University of the West of Scotland and should normally hold an undergraduate degree in a related discipline. Exceptions may be made in the case of applicants who can demonstrate significant relevant experience together with recent academic study.

Career Prospects

This module will enhance practitioners' knowledge, practice and expertise in Citizenship and Holocaust Education. As a Masters' level qualification, it will make a significant contribution to participants' Career Long Professional Learning (CLPL).
